Ganesh festival, or Ganesh Utsav, is one of the main Hindu festivals in India. It is dedicated to Lord Ganesha, the god of wisdom, prosperity, and new beginnings. It helps to get people united in joy. It is celebrated between August to September, during the Hindu month of Bhadrapada.

Ganesh Chaturthi cherishes the birth of Lord Ganesha, the beloved son of Lord Shiva and Goddess Parvati. According to Hindu mythology, Lord Ganesha was blessed by various gods for bringing fortunes and removing barriers. This festival became prominent in the late 19th century when the freedom fighter Lokmanya Bal Gangadhar Tilak encouraged people to celebrate Ganesh Utsav in gatherings. This helped raise collective spirits while Indians were struggling for independence.

The festival begins with installing crafted idols (usually made of mud) of Lord Ganesha in homes or public pandals. People perform rituals like pranapratishta, the act of invoking life into the idol, followed by aarti, or prayer with lamps. There is chanting of hymns and offering sweets like modaks, which are Ganesha's favourite.




The duration for this festival varies from one-and-a-half days to eleven days. On the final day, known as Anant Chaturdashi, devotees immerse the idols in water in a ritual called Ganesh Visarjan. This symbolises the cycle of creation and dissolution in nature.

Today, Ganesh Chaturthi is not only celebrated in India but also overseas in large Indian communities. Ganesh festival is a celebration of culture and community which brings people together and teaches us the importance of unity and gratitude.

International Teachers' Day is celebrated on 5th October every year.


